Our gardening sessions (pictured) are meeting again under the rule of six outdoors at the community hub, which has also seen its café open in recent weeks.


There's also activity going on at Titchy Park after we consulted with you about improvements you'd like to see there.

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Gardening sessions at the Beacon







Residents are being asked to help care for new trees which have been planted in North Prospect.

Our three-person strong tree team has planted trees across the city in recent weeks, including some in Wolseley Road and Ham Drive as part of our annual tree planting programme.

In total, 39 trees have been planted. This includes those planted by Plymouth City Council on our land as part of their Plan for Trees programme.

This year, we're asking residents to get involved with looking after the trees – and we're giving them the help they need to get started.

Each tree will have a sustainable tag on it explaining how to care for it. We're also developing a Google Maps web page which shows where new trees are located.

Clicking on an icon of each tree reveals further information about the tree including its species.

Species we've planted include lime, beech, oak, hawthorn, birch, poplar, apple and sweet chestnut.

Our Arboriculturist, Joe Berryman, said: "It takes three years for a tree to be fully independent. After care involves watering and adjusting the sticks and ties that support them. We put mulch or woodchip around the base and that needs to be turned over. You can use dish water or bath water to water the trees.

"If people feel involved and know where the trees are, they can take some ownership. We'd like people to become guardians of the trees."

"While out and about on the sites we look after, carrying out tree works and surveying, we see areas that are looking bare of tree cover, and consider what species of tree might work here.

"We consider things like the site's light, soil and wind conditions, what other species grow in the area, and the space available to plant trees. This information helps us in our planning.

"We'd also like to hear your feedback – what trees would you like to see and where?"

PHASE 4 AND 5 UPDATE

COULD YOU NAME OUR NEW HOMES?

These images show the progress being made on the new over 55s apartment block at Phase 5 (Briarwood), which is now up to roof height.

Kier Living is building 143 homes for us – 81 for affordable housing and shared ownership.

This includes 33 social rent flats for the over 55s, which are due to be finished in December of this year.

The apartment block is currently nameless – can you help us choose a suitable name for it?

Nicola Daniel, Senior Project Manager at PCH, said: "The flats are now starting to take shape and we are targeting completion for the end of 2021. The building does not yet have a name – we're happy to take any suggestions for review!

"We've now taken handover of 30 affordable homes – 19 shared ownership and 11 for affordable rent. Kier's private sales are strong – over half the private plots are now occupied."

Kier will have 62 homes in this phase for open market sale.

The entire phase is due to be completed early next year.

Phase 4 update

Phase 4 (Mayflower Leat) is also progressing well and you should notice plots going up along Dingle Road and NorthProspect Road.

Contractor Vistry Partnerships has temporarily closed the footpath to the immediate perimeter of the site, including North Prospect Road, Laurel Road and Dingle Road on the 'site side' only.

Vistry Partnerships is building 196 homes in this phase – 87 for rent, 38 for shared ownership and 71 for open market sale.

Jo Agnew, PCH Project Manager, said: "The first plots, which will form part of the sales area, are nearly finished and the SO Living show home should be opening in July, Covid restrictions allowing.

"We are expecting the first homes to be handed over in the summer.

"Linden, who are selling the Vistry homes, have already started marketing their plots and are seeing strong interest from potential buyers with some already reserved."

The scheme is due to be completed in 2024.

Leatherjackets

We've had reports of problems with leatherjackets in the gardens at some of our new homes. Leatherjackets are the larvae of the crane fly or daddy-longlegs which feed on grass roots and can damage lawns.

We are encouraging all new build owner/occupiers to treat their lawns for at least the first two years with an organic solution called nematodes to prevent infestation.

Generally it should be watered onto the lawn between April and May and then again between August and October but please check specific product instructions.

Please check your lawn regularly for signs of leatherjacket larvae and follow the necessary maintenance.

TITCHY PARK UPDATE

We've already started to make improvements to a popular North Prospect park following feedback from you.

Earlier this year, we asked residents to tell us about their experiences of Titchy Park, in Greatlands Crescent, so we can try and make it better for everyone.

Lots of you responded to our online and postal survey and we've been going through your comments over the past few weeks.

We've already got the ball rolling on a few improvements. We're installing another litter bin near the main gate for dog walkers and have ordered an additional sign for the internal park gate.

We're hoping to repaint the swing frame at some point and our Rangers will be giving the hopscotch and snakes and ladders game a good clean.

We also recently removed the shelter that was in the park as it was old and beyond repair.

Next, we'll be asking you what type of benches you'd like it replaced with – nearly three quarters of you said there should be more picnic benches in the park.

Altogether, 61 residents completed our survey. Nearly 80 per cent of residents say they use Titchy Park at least once a month.

Nearly half of you – 48 per cent – rate their experience of the park as 'positive' or 'very positive' while 13 per cent rated their experience as 'negative' or 'very negative'.


Leigh Ferguson, North Prospect Communities Worker, said: "We'd like to thank everyone who filled in our survey. There are opportunities for people to get involved with what happens next. It's really important that any changes we look to make have the backing of the local community.

"When we're allowed to, I'm quite keen to get some activities running in the park. We're also looking at funds for equipment like trampolines and whether it would be feasible to add further play equipment for younger children.

"Our teams will continue to clean the park three times a week and we'll continue to work with the local policing team to address the anti-social behaviour. We may also try and arrange community litter picks. We'll also continue to lock up the park at key times in the evenings and consider extending these throughout the holidays.

"People who have expressed an interest will be contacted about how they can get involved but we're keen to talk to more people so please do get in touch with me if you'd like to have your say."

Jo Lake, Beacon Manager, said: "Any profits we make from the café go back into developing our communities so you can rest assured your cuppa is helping a good cause. We'd ask people to wear a face mask when they visit."

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As lockdown starts to ease and things go back to normal, activity at the Beacon community hub is gathering pace.

The Beacon is a great place for North Prospect residents to get together – lots of groups meet there and it features a café.

We had to close the building due to the pandemic but activities are starting up again – albeit outdoors for the time being.

Our Tea and Toast group had to move its weekly sessions online when lockdown began last year.

We're happy to say the group has resumed meeting in person outdoors at the Beacon – but places must be booked in advance.

The sessions will continue meeting online on Tuesday mornings in addition to the face-to-face meetings.

Our fortnightly gardening sessions also started up at the end of last month. Again, you can't just turn up as all sessions are operating under the rule of six.

Communities Worker Leigh Ferguson runs both groups. Speaking after the first session last month, he said: "The session was a success. I think people enjoyed the chance to meet face to face and enjoy a complimentary drink from The Beacon Café.

"Those in attendance make up the bulk of those who have been coming to the virtual group I have been running for the past 12 months. Future sessions include more members from the community."
